

#### **General Information**

#### Advising, Career & Transfer

Students have access to personalized academic advising, guided exploration of career opportunities, labor market analysis information on career and employment trends, preparation for job interviews, and transfer assistance to continue education at another institution of higher education.

#### **Computer Resources**

Students have access to computers in open computer labs at both the Fairfield and Alfond Campuses. The Department of Labor (DOL) Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College Career Trading Grant (TAACCCT) and the Harold Alfond Foundation have provided funds to upgrade technology and to ensure that KVCC maintains a state-of-the-art technology center for KVCC students.

#### **Disability Services**

KVCC is committed to providing assistance to students with a documented disability. Assistance is available to students who may require accommodations to access courses and/or campus activities/events.

#### Early College for ME

The Maine Community College System (MCCS) and KVCC are committed to helping high school students attend college. Early College for ME is a college transition program for students who are high school students and undecided about higher education plans, yet who have the potential to succeed in college. MCCS provides approximately 35 scholarships each Fall semester for these students to attend KVCC.

# Learning Commons – Lunder Library / Averill Hall

The Learning Commons fosters collaborative learning, provides a welcoming and flexible learning environment, and inspires students to discover, create, solve problems and collaborate with their peers. The Commons consolidates services under one roof and brings together library, technology, and academic support services. The KVCC library provides access to information resources and services such as research assistance, online resources and interlibrary loan. The library offers more than 130 electronic databases, which together provide access to some 75,000 e-books, 30,000 full-text journals, 20,000 medical illustrations, 7,000 streaming videos, 2,000 audio books and more. The library's physical collection is complemented by a state-wide collection of more than 7.6 million additional items.

#### **Mathport**

The Mathport offers free math tutoring to all KVCC students. Academic support is offered for students take a math class or those preparing to take placement tests.

#### **TRIO**

The TRiO program is intended to assist low-income, first generation students as well as students with a documented disability to help them persist and graduate from KVCC within four years. Services provided include individual and group tutoring in math, science, technology, and English as well as intensive monitoring, advising and registration.

#### **Writing Center**

The KVCC Writing Center helps students of all abilities grow into stronger, more effective writers by providing individualized support at all stages of the writing process. It aims to promote writing as a means of learning by supporting faculty and staff in writing across the curriculum efforts.







# **Enrollment Status: Degree- Seeking Students**

# **Enrollment Status: Undeclared Students**










#### Fall Term Enrollment 2008-2015: ALL Credit Students




Fall Term Enrollment 2008-2015: Degree-Seeking Students (KVCC2020 Measure 1.1a, Data First Form: Standard 5 Students)




#### Spring Enrollment 2009 - 2016: ALL Credit Students








#### **Gender\*: Undeclared Students**




#### Average Student Age (Data First Form: Standard 5 Students)




#### Median Student Age (Data First Form: Standard 5 Students)




### Status of Degree-Seeking Students (KVCC2020 Measure 1.1d))






#### **Students Taking Online Courses ONLY**




#### Students Taking Online AND Seated Classes

# Number of Registrations in Experiential Learning Courses




#### Student Disability Trends 2010-2015: Percent



# Tuition Waiver and Dual Enrollment: Number of Course Registrations By Academic Year




Dual Enrollment includes college courses offered at the high school by the high school. All courses require the same level of commitment as classes taught on the college campus.

Tuition waiver courses are available to high school juniors or seniors who have a B average or better. Tuition waiver courses are college courses offered on the KVCC campus or online.



Active and Collaborative Learning: 2016 CCSSE Benchmark Comparisons (weighted)





#### Student Effort: 2016 CCSSE Benchmark Comparisons (weighted)








#### **Grade Distribution for Fall 2015**





\*Gateway courses are required for Career and Trade degree studies and have a high enrollment of first year students. Successful completion of these courses are critical for successful student retention and degree completion. Gateway courses are often defined as courses that are lower in division, foundational in nature, have high enrollment of students and are higher in risk for non-completion. Success in these courses often correlate with successful retention and completion of students in post-secondary institutions.

In 2012, KVCC received a Title 3 grant funded by the United States Department of Education. The purpose of the legislation that established the Title III-A program is to improve the academic quality, institutional management, and fiscal stability of eligible institutions, in order to increase their self-sufficiency and strengthen their capacity to make a substantial contribution to the higher education resources of the Nation. KVCC is using Title 3 funds to increase completion rates in key math and science gateway courses.






#### 2011 – 2015 First-Year Retention Rates: Full-Time Students




2009 - 2015: Average Amount of Student Aid





# Number of Course Registrations by Year and Course Type




# Number of Credit Hours Enrolled by Year and Course Type

#### **Mission**

The KVCC Foundation engages supporters to invest in students, faculty and programs to empower individuals and to build stronger communities.

### **History**

The KVCC Foundation was established in 1991 with the goal of supporting both the College and its students. The Foundation has raised an endowment portfolio of over **\$4 million** to support student scholarships, technology, equipment, and access to student support services. Since its inception, the KVCC Foundation has awarded over **\$1.6 million** in student scholarships, opening the doors to education for more than **1,600** KVCC students.

### Why Scholarships?



# Workshops, Seminars & Courses: Participant Contact Hours\*\*




