I am delighted to release THE first ever **Kennebec Valley Community College Fact Book.** The information and data presented in the 2014 KVCC Fact Book underscore the college's mission, vision, and values. It is built on a foundation that includes a focus on student involvement and successes, as well as the institution's commitment to local industry, community members and key organizations.

The KVCC Fact Book is meant to be an annual reference tool and will remain a work in progress. Information presented is intended to assist the College in becoming a data-driven institution that strives for measurable results. The data presented in this report reflect all

The 2014 KVCC Fact Book provides pertinent facts and figures valuable to administrators, faculty, staff, students and various external constituents to help engender a better understanding of the scope and progress of the College.

- There are ten major sections to the 2014 KVCC Fact Book. Sections 2 through 6 focus on student characteristics, such as enrollment trends for degree-seeking and non-degree-seeking students, student success and engagement, and financial assistance.
- Institutional data is presented in sections 7 through 9. In these sections, the KVCC Fact Book reports on KVCC's Foundation as well as the College's financial data, including private and public grants that are critical in supporting the overall mission and purpose of the College.

In 2013 Kennebec Valley Community College began its largest expansion in its 43-year history with the addition of the Harold Alfond Campus in the nearby village of Hinckley, Maine. In Section 11, the Annual Fact Book concludes with "A Look to Our Future—Alfond Campus" where the vision and accomplishments to date in the establishment of the second campus are discussed.

At the request of my office, the 2014 KVCC Fact Book initiative was led by Karen Glew, Director of Institutional Research. 

General Information

Advising, Career & Transfer

Students have access to personalized academic advising, guided exploration of career opportunities, labor market analysis information on career and employment trends, preparation for job interviews, and transfer assistance to continue education at another institution of higher education.

Computer Resources

Students have access to computers in open computer labs at both the Fairfield and Alfond Campuses. The Department of Labor (DOL) Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College Career Trading Grant (TAACCCT) and the Harold Alfond Foundation have provided funds to upgrade technology and to ensure that KVCC maintains a state-of-the-art technology center for KVCC students.

Disability Services

KVCC is committed to providing assistance to students with a documented disability. Assistance is available to students who may require accommodations to access courses and/or campus activities/events.

Early College for ME

The Maine Community College System (MCCS) and KVCC are committed to helping high school students attend college. Early College for ME is a college transition program for students who are high school students and undecided about higher education plans, yet who have the potential to succeed in college. MCCS provides approximately 35 scholarships each Fall semester for these students to attend KVCC.

Learning Commons – Lunder Library / Averill Hall

The Learning Commons fosters collaborative learning, provides a welcoming and flexible learning environment, and inspires students to discover, create, solve problems and collaborate with their peers. The Commons consolidates services under one roof and brings together library, technology, and academic support services. The KVCC library provides access to information resources and services such as research assistance, online resources and interlibrary loan. The library offers more than 130 electronic databases, which together provide access to some 75,000 e-books, 30,000 full-text journals, 20,000 medical illustrations, 7,000 streaming videos, 2,000 audio books and more. The library's physical collection of 13,000 items is complemented by a state-wide collection of more than 7.6 million additional items.

TRIO

The TRiO program is intended to assist low-income, first generation students as well as students with a documented disability to help them persist and graduate from KVCC within four years. Services provided include individual and group tutoring in math, science, technology, and English as well as intensive monitoring, advising and registration.

Writing Center

The KVCC Writing Center helps students of all abilities grow into stronger, more effective writers by providing individualized support at all stages of the writing process. It aims to promote writing as a means of learning by supporting faculty and staff in writing across the curriculum efforts.




Enrollment Status: Degree-Seeking Students




Enrollment Status: Undeclared Students




Average Age







Age Ranges: Undeclared Students




Profile of Fall 2013












Race/Ethnicity Comparison


Fall Term Enrollment 2008-2013: ALL Credit Students




Fall Term Enrollment 2008-2013: Degree-Seeking Students




Spring Enrollment 2009 – 2014: ALL Credit Students




Spring Enrollment 2009 – 2014: Degree-Seeking Students




Average Student Age









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
Students Taking Online Courses ONLY




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
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Student Orientation and Registration

KVCC First Year Experience Compared to College Cohort





- When reviewing differences between 2011 and 2013, item means in the Support for Learners domain increased in four out of the seven items. The largest mean increase (+0.21) was in "Providing the support you need to help you succeed at this college."
- "Providing the support you need to help you succeed at this college" and "Providing financial support you need to afford your education" had the largest mean increase between 2009 and 2013. "Providing the financial support you need to afford your education" had a mean increase of 0.36.

 Results from the 2013 CCSSE administration indicate the KVCC percentage was slightly higher than the 2013 Cohort and consistent when compared to other small colleges.



ITEM: Providing the support you need to help you succeed at this college

- KVCC mean (3.25) was significantly higher than Achieve the Dream schools (3.02), the Custom Cohort (3.01), other rural schools (3.04) and the 2013 CCSSE cohort (3.01). This item had the largest differential increase (unweighted mean) in this domain.
- The mean for First Generation students was significantly higher at KVCC (3.27) when compared to First Generation students at large schools (2.96) and the 2013 CCSSE cohort (2.99).

ITEM: Helping you cope with your non-academic responsibilities (work, family, etc.)

• The mean for Non-First Generation students was significantly higher at KVCC (2.17) when compared to Non-First Generation students at large schools (1.91) and the 2013 CCSSE cohort (1.94)






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
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Grade Distribution for Fall 2013







Remedial Math and Algebra Coursework: KVCC Student Successful Completion Rates











Number and Percentage of Maine Community College Graduates Who Pursued Further Education**







2009 - 2014: Average Amount of Student Aid



Mission

To provide area citizens with an accessible and affordable quality education. The KVCC Foundation Board of Trustees achieves this goal by raising funds to promote and support all educational programs; to provide state-of-the art equipment and facilities; and to ensure access through scholarship funds for needy students.

History

The KVCC Foundation was established in 1991 with the goal of supporting both the College and its students. The Foundation has raised an endowment portfolio of over \$3.8 million to support student scholarships, technology and equipment upgrades, and access to student support services. Since its inception, the Foundation has awarded over \$1.1 million in student scholarships, opening the doors to education for more than 1,200 KVCC students.

Why Scholarships?

Students often struggle to fill the gap between financial aid awards and the total cost of college (tuition, books, tools, transportation, childcare, etc). For many, this task is insurmountable without scholarship support. 



Fall 2014 and Beyond – Harold Alfond Campus

Acquisition of the Harold Alfond Campus

Kennebec Valley Community College (KVCC) has begun the largest expansion in its 43-year history.

Thanks to a \$10.85 million gift from the Harold Alfond Foundation, KVCC has acquired the central campus of the former Good Will-Hinckley (GWH) School, which encompasses approximately 600 acres of land and more than a dozen facilities including an academic building, modern recreation center, and farm. Officially announced at a press conference at the Blaine House in Augusta on Jan. 23 2012, the acquisition has set the stage for a new chapter of growth at KVCC that will dominate affairs at the College for many years to come. In May of 2012, the new campus was officially named KVCC's Harold Alfond Campus to acknowledge the generosity of the late philanthropist Harold Alfond and the Foundation that bears his name.

- The property includes a mix of fields, woods, and wetlands on the west side of U.S. Route 201 roughly bounded to the south by Green Road and to the north by Martin Stream. The parcel also includes frontage on the Kennebec River to the east of 201.
- Major structures acquired include the Alfond/Averill School building, the Alfond Recreation Center, Moody Memorial Chapel, and numerous smaller structures.
- KVCC also acquired the former Good Will-Hinckley farm a 120-acre property now being revitalized which is central to new farm-to-table programs in sustainable agriculture, culinary arts, and food science.

Over time, The Alfond Foundation's gift will enable the Maine Community College System to expand the capacity of KVCC to offer academic programs unique to Central Maine such as an Associate of Applied Science in Sustainable Agriculture, Timber Framing, and an Exploration Center focused around KVCC's Early Childhood Education program.

While challenges abound, the opportunities afforded by the new Alfond Campus have positioned KVCC to grow far beyond anything envisioned before. The College will be proceeding carefully as that process unfolds, guided by the needs of its students and a desire to be a good steward of the historic property.

For KVCC these are exciting times. The acquisition has increased the College's acreage tenfold. Programs that would have been impossible at the current campus are suddenly feasible.

Harold Alfond Campus Takes Shape in 2013-2014

In addition to the Alfond Foundation, KVCC's ability to access a variety of funding sources such as the Department of Labor Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College Career Training, State of Maine Bond, Sewell Foundation and other major contributions are helping to create state of the art learning facilities.

The campus took a huge step forward in the fall of 2013 as KVCC broke ground on a new, 16,500 square-foot classroom and laboratory building completed for the start of the 2014 fall semester, when KVCC officially opened the Alfond Campus to house the KVCC Center for Farm-to-Table innovation.

- The building contains classrooms, faculty offices, laboratories, a computer lab, a 60-seat tiered auditorium, a student lounge and informal learning space.
- This new structure is central to KVCC's transition to a two-campus college. Many of the college's existing academic programs located at the Fairfield campus have moved to an existing classroom building on the Alfond Campus in Hinckley for the Fall semester. These programs include Business, Education, Liberal Studies and Mental Health.
- Sustainable agriculture, culinary arts and food technology are based on the Alfond Campus, with sustainable agriculture based in the new building.
- Designed with the goal of achieving net zero energy status, the building will incorporate geothermal wells and a large photovoltaic panel array on its roof to supply electricity and energy for heating and cooling.

KVCC is committed to providing students on the Alfond Campus with access to each of the services that KVCC students have come to expect on the Fairfield campus. On the Alfond Campus, students can find access to services, such as enrollment, student orientation, registration, advising, and a Learning Commons complete with library services, computer access, tutoring, testing preparation and disability services.

Though geographically separated, the Fairfield and Alfond campuses are linked through technology and a history of institutional commitment by staff, administrators and faculty.

This modern facility will have a soft opening in January 2015. The Grand Opening of the Harold Alfond Campus is scheduled for August 2015.
